
State Reporter Kayleigh Harney also hosted her FDM and reported that it was a fun and educational experience for all attendees. Here is what she wrote about her FDM:





2020 by me, Alex Robinson, alongside my
brother, Maxwell Robinson, after a
heartwarming experience during a holiday
gift drive at UCCW (United Community
Center of Westchester). While distributing
homemade cookies, we noticed that
children and families were often more
excited about the treats than the gifts. This
sparked a conversation with the charity
director, Jackie Agudelo, revealing a
significant gap: while many donated gifts,
there was a lack of cakes and desserts to

celebrate special occasions.

Inspired by this insight, we set out to spread joy and create lasting memories through delectable cakes and desserts. Since our inception, we have grown into a team of over 700 dedicated members, making and donating over 1,000 cakes and 10,000 desserts to families in need. Our efforts have garnered recognition from local and state authorities, and we have raised over \$50,000 to support our mission.

What began as a simple idea has blossomed into a movement, inspiring communities across New Jersey, New York City, Massachusetts, Tennessee, and Texas. At Cakes for Communities, we believe that every cake has the power to bring smiles and create meaningful celebrations, reminding us all of the joy in giving and sharing.



How to Nail the Secretarial Sciences!

A secretary is expected to complete various responsibilities, but perhaps one of the most important of their duties would be taking minutes, as it helps to provide a record of the business discussed at meeting, delegate different responsibilities, address pertinent deadlines and provide an update for the work of various committees. This may seem like a daunting task, but by utilizing these tips on how to nail the secretarial sciences, you will be able to gain valuable insight to how to stay organized, use parliamentary procedure and present your ideas effectively, as well as ensure your local chapter's success! Throughout the school year, the secretary will be expected to keep an updated record of the minutes for each meeting, as well as help to organize different facets of communications, utilizing email and social media to help stay in contact with members and organize various events.

Managing all of this requires extreme organizational skills, especially when creating the minutes for a meeting. It is best to create an outline ahead of time, using a prepared agenda to have a list of the topics that will be discussed, creating a general flow of how the meeting will run. Not only will this ensure that the notes are created in clear, concise manner, it will make revisions much easier, because everything is organized ahead of time and delegated amongst the categories in the orders of the day (a general outline of the events that happen in a parliamentary procedure session). While in the meeting, pay attention to the things that are being discussed and try to highlight the most important information, rather than unnecessary details. This is much easier to do by having some background knowledge on parliamentary procedure. Regardless of whether all these formalities in parliamentary procedure are employed by your own chapter, is it beneficial to have a fundamental understanding of the different motions, voting and rules of debate. If you ever feel confused by something in a meeting, always feel free to ask for clarification! Finally, once the meeting is over and you are making final revisions on the minutes, proofread the notes thoroughly, by reading them aloud, double checking facts and consulting a second opinion if you ever feel unsure about a piece of information. The best way to ensure the greatest quality of work is to ask questions and be open to constructive criticism. Once you are sure that the

minutes are completed to the best of your ability and are done so within an appropriate timeline, distribute them to all attendees of the meeting, in addition to the people that were absent. There is no ideal way to distribute the minutes, and it can be done through email, a shared document or even handing out hard copies. Regardless of how you choose to distribute them, it must be done in a way that best reflects the needs of your chapter. All this responsibility may seem intimidating, but being a secretary is an extremely rewarding experience, because this individual plays an integral role within their local chapter, by managing communication. Communication is an invaluable asset in the business world, and secretarial sciences are a major part of it. Through effective communication, there is no limit to what you can achieve! Regardless of where your FBLA journey takes you this year, as a member of a Program of Work committee, fellow competitor or local chapter officer, do not hesitate to utilize these tips and reach out to secretary@nysfbla.org with any questions so that we can collaborate for a year of success!
